CHAIR REPORT

How quickly the days start to shorten. After a really good summer (for the Highlands!) the long winter nights and falling temperatures are drawing closer. With this in mind the Trust's focus is turning to how it works with the community to ease the impact of the cost of living 'crisis.'

The last time we were all faced with a really challenging environment was of course the pandemic. This feels very different. Covid-19 and the lockdowns caused sudden shocks; people lost their living overnight; parttime jobs disappeared, holiday rentals dried up, the hospitality industry shut down. This time the impact of rising costs on our standard of living is slow and accretive, the pressure on the family budget is incremental. The point at which family finances hit a crisis is unpredictable and its impact on households is staggered over many months. What is the 'canary in the mine' the warning system that will alert our community to the reality that people are in trouble?

The best we can do now is make a plan, putting in place initiatives to ease the

pressure and making sure that everyone is aware of what help is available. With this in mind, the Brolly Group has been reconvened. You will recall that during the pandemic this voluntary pancommunity group coordinated our response. Later in the magazine you will find details of what is planned. Some of the initiatives are good to go – others are at a conceptual stage, and we will provide further information as they take shape. Critically, the Brolly Group wants to hear your ideas on what needs to be done to help. You will find details of who to contact in the article.

On a completely different note, you will also find a story about a social event held for volunteers. They got together for a convivial evening to celebrate the events and activities that have been made possible by the 'volunteer army.' It is the people who are prepared to lend their expertise and time that make a difference to this community and not the Trust. Our mission is to support and facilitate, help people to make things happen. If we forget this is our role; don't hesitate to remind us!

Out of 6 - 1 being very poor and 6 being very good - you gave the event a average score of 4.52.


WOULD YOU GO NEXT YEAR?

SPATIAL PLANNING

Following the Community Action Plan completed in late 2021, Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust have been facilitating delivery of the five sets of action priorities in the plan.

Although the Community Action Plan identified action priorities and illustrated how they might impact on individuals' lives, it stopped short of producing spatial plans illustrating how each settlement in the area (and the area as a whole) would look and function once the Plan has been implemented.

For example, for each of the following action priorities identified in the Community Action Plan:

- Affordable community-owned homes where should they be built?
- Local community hubs, recreational facilities and playparks - where are the gaps that need to be filled?
- After-school / nursery care where should it happen?
- Walking and cycling networks which routes should be the primary focus?
- Better walking, cycling and community transport to schools, community hubs etc what needs to happen, and where?

The Community Trust wishes to take this next step, and engage the local community to plan how the Community Action Plan's priorities should be distributed and implemented across the local area. The work needs both engage the local community and other stakeholders, and produce a spatial plan for the community.

More specifically, the aims are to:

- Help the local community explore and understand how 'their place' will look in the future once the Community Action Plan has been implemented.
- Engage community groups, public sector organisations, businesses and landowners to incorporate their existing work and influence their future activity, where it contributes to the Community Action Plan action priorities.
- Inform where Community Action Plan investments and improvements should take place (as opposed to reviewing the priorities already agreed in the Community Action Plan).
- Prepare a Local Place Plan document which can be shared with the public sector to guide and influence their local planning and service delivery in the community's interests.

BOARD REPORT

The Stratherrick and Foyers Board met on Wednesday 7th September for a two and a ³/₄ hour meeting. Some highlights are below...

NEW VICE CHAIR

Gareth Jones announced Catriona Fraser had agreed to take the role of Vice Chair.

STUDENT GRANTS

Student Grants were awarded to Hamish Bain, Maire Brown (who declared an interest and left the meeting) and Annalise Beith. Grants were awarded to the Community Council, Stratherricka Public Hall and Kilchuimen Academy were able to adapt to their grant for the benefit of Stratherrick and Foyers based children.

DATES FOR EVENTS

Winter Wonderland date was confirmed as 9th and 10th December. The Highland Gathering will be 22nd July. Fireworks 5th November.

COST OF LIVING SUPPORT

SSE have informed the Trust that we share a policy with them on supporting individuals during the cost of living crisis. Once agreed we can support individuals with grants of up to £250 (£500 per household) on food and fuel over two winters. A meeting with Knockie Trust representatives has confirmed a way forward which will be put to SSE once the Knockie Trust Board approve.

PLANNING FOR THE AGM

The AGM is fast approaching and recommendations for changes to the constitution were put forward to read.

KEY PRIORITIES MONITORING

In Board Papers we shared our Community Action Plan with priorities, by when expected, KPI / Outcomes / Outputs, staff supporting this Board activity and budget allocated. This will be our working document. Staff Work Plans (also enclosed in Board Papers) touch on what staff are working on this quarter.

RENEWABLES INCOME

A report by Sharon Ferguson was presented on current income from renewables, renewables with planning but not in operation and those still to be determined.

CARES GRANT

The Board agreed to a Cares Funding Application to help decarbonize buildings to ensure lower running costs.

COST OF LIVING CRISIS -HOW CAN WE HELP?

Cost of Living Crisis - What help is out there

The recent promise of an energy price CAP has brought some relief for hard pressed individuals and families. However, costs continue to rise putting immense pressure on household budgets. The staff and directors at Stratherrick & Foyers Community Trust are working with funders, community groups and other stakeholders to see what can be done to ease the impact of the cost of living crisis.

Brolly Group

You will recall that during the pandemic, the response to the crisis was led by the Brolly Group, a pan-community organisation comprising the S&FCT, Knockie Trust, Community Council and Boleskine Community Care. This has reassembled to coordinate the response to the cost of living crisis with Trust staff providing technical and admin support.

What is happening?

Ideas on how best to respond are currently being collated – please get in touch with Tony Foster by emailing tony-ceo@sfctrust.org.uk if you have suggestions. Below are ideas that could help people reduce their living costs:

- Help with bills. The Knockie Trust has agreed to manage the distribution of community benefit funds to individuals and families who are facing hardship. An initial sum of £10,000 has been allocated to help meet food and heating costs. More information on this will be circulated shortly.
- Warm Space Wednesday. The search is on for buildings that can be made available during the winter where people work and meet and save on the cost of heating their own home. Wildside is currently open for community members to use for work on a Wednesday. In October, the Trust will launch 'Warm Space Wednesday', where all areas of The Wildside Centre will be open for you to meet socially, use the kitchen space, children's play equipment etc. The Pilates class is on between 10am and 11am, after which the room will be available. The front room is free all day. Members of the Brolly Group are looking at what space they can make available.
- Soup to Go every Monday at The Wildside Centre. They offer a healthy, low-cost meal and the opportunity to socialise in a warm and comfortable environment. You can also have your meal delivered.
- **Toddler Group** meets every Thursday at The Wildside Centre. This gives families with young children the opportunity to make use of a community space and kitchen facilities as well as

being able to socialise with other community members with young children.

- Boleskine Community Care has a range of activities available on a weekly and monthly basis at the Hub in Lower Foyers, including coffee mornings, Broth n Blether, and art, singing & fitness sessions. A full list of what's going in in September can be found on the back page of this newsletter.
- **Daily Drop In**. The Hub is also open for drop-ins daily between 11am and 1pm, so please do call in for a warm drink and a chat when you are passing!
- The Whitebridge Hotel team is running their much loved Fish Friday and extend a warm invitation to all to enjoy a fish tea. It is an opportunity to meet new people in the community in the comfort of their lovely dining space at the Hotel. The food is offered at a discounted price and there will be activities to add to the fun; music of your choice, a wee quiz or game and a good old natter. You are advised to book in advance. The hotel is also offering a discount on food and accommodation for members of the Stratherrick and Foyers Community. - Firewood. In rural populations such as ours, open fires and wood burning stoves are a means of heating your home. Forestry and Land Scotland can sell the remnants of harvesting jobs on a first-come, first-served basis. There are options available here for individuals to purchase small amounts for their own use, or it may be possible for a larger load to be bought at a lower price for community use. Contact F&LS at enquiries.north@forestryandland.gov.scot or by telephone 03000 676000 for more information.
- Highland Council clothing and meals support. Clothing Grants and Free School Meals applications for the school term commencing August 2022 opened on 1 July 2022. The School Clothing Grant is £140 for Primary School children and £150 for High School children. To apply for a grant, you will find an online application form here https://tinyurl.com/2s2ahrbt If you have any issues with our online application form or questions about the free school meals and clothing assistance scheme, then contact Highland Council by email at clothingandmeals@highland.gov.uk. Alternatively, Highland Council's Welfare Support Team can be contacted at welfare.support@highland.gov.uk for advice and assistance in making an application.
- Young Scot Card. All young people between the ages of 11 and 26 are entitled a Young Scot Card, which entitles the owner to a wide range of discounts - examples include Vue Cinema, Harry Gow - 20% max £1 off, and 10% off your shopping at the Coop. In January, free bus travel was also added to this. For a full list of what discounts are available, visit www.youngscot/discounts-and-rewards/discounts

WHAT IS PLANNED?

A range of ideas have been pulled together by the fundraising team at the Trust. They include the following:

- Extend Warm Space Wednesday at Wildside.
- Community larders in the buildings the community has access to such as the Wildside, the Hub at BCC and Gorthleck hall when it re-opens. Thought is also being given to how this help can be accessed discretely.
- Energy saving workshops for domestic properties and businesses. This is being investigated alongside a project to de-carbonise the Wildside centre and lower the heating bills.
- Simple survey to ask the Community for suggestions and get a feel for how things are. The findings would give the fundraisers evidence for funding applications.
