We have been in discussion with SSE about using some of the community benefit money to alleviate the impact on the most hardpressed individuals and families in the area. We have now received guidance from SSE that the money can be used to ease financial hardship over the next couple of years. We are now consulting with voluntary organisations to work out how best to manage this.

SOUTH LOCH NESS HERITAGE GROUP VISIT TO KIRKMICHAEL

For our first summer outing since 2015, the South Loch Ness Heritage Group had a field trip on the 2nd July 2022 to the refurbished Medieval Kirkmichael in the Black Isle. The Kirkmichael Trust under the chairmanship of Dr Jim Maclean have repaired the ancient and derelict buildings at Kirkmichael and created a unique display of local refurbished buildings. Jim met the group and explained the layout of the old and new parts of the adjoining graveyard, why the older part is raised a couple of feet in height above new, due to the density of interments over the last six hundred years in that part. Also explained and showed example of pre reformation flat grave stones, table stones and the upright gravestones One of Jim's colleagues Davine showed

us the only Gaelic gravestone in the cemetery even though that was the language spoken in the district, all of the older gravestones were engraved with old Scots. Jim then took us inside the refurbished Chancel and Nave of the church and explained the reason for the also regaling us with stories about some of the families within the area that were interred in the churchyard. The subject of photogrammetry was explained to us which is taking about 50 photographs of a badly eroded gravestone in various angles and in different lights and by a computer programme a more clear indication of what is carved on the stone can be obtained. The Trust has done a marvellous job at the site and are still actively repairing stones etc on site each Saturday. Our group were fascinated by has been done, and still ongoing.

Locally in our district we have Boleskine cemetery which the earliest stone recorded to date is 1729, which within its boundary has a Mort House, one of only two in the North of Scotland. On seeing what has been done at Kirkmichael surely there is scope for a similar project here.





NEWFOUNDLAND FORESTERS IN SCOTLAND – TALK BY ALISDAIR CAMERON

During both World Wars, extra timber was urgently needed and thousands of lumberjacks were recruited by the UK from Newfoundland (Newfies) to help cut and process trees, mostly in Scotland.

Unlike the Canadian Timber Corps the Newfoundlanders were not military men (Newfoundland was not part of the Canadian Federation till 1949) and volunteered to come to Britain. Generally the Canadians set up the camps and sawmills and moved on leaving them to be operated by the Newfoundlanders. The sawmills were set up all over the country where there was available timber, mainly in Scotland.

Remnants of the mill at Whitebridge, just north of the Wildside Centre was examined and photographed by Alasdair and featured in the presentation, where 35 people came to hear Alasdair's fascinating talk. He included slides of the crowded boats that crossed the Atlantic, foresters in action, maps of camps and a historic newsreel. Many Newfies stayed and married local lassies.

Alasdair brought his collection of old axes (including double-bladed) and tools, and our own Alister Chisholm

displayed his grandfather's Board of Trade purchase order dating from 1946 for equipment from the Whitebridge sawmill. On display was the large circular saw blade and rollers from the bench.

A Newfoundland man living in Invergarry came to the talk and brought his father who had arrived in Scotland the previous day to visit his family. They added greatly to the discussions afterwards. It was good to hear the noisy hubbub of a live interactive meeting.

FINAL PIECE OF THE CAP JIGSAW

The development of the Community Action Plan, committed to paper at the end of last year, was only ever one half of the task of settling on how the community wants the 'wind farm money' spent.

This week the Trust commissioned the consultant who facilitated the development of the CAP, to produce plans illustrating what people in each of the six settlements in Stratherrick and Foyers would like to see happen on their doorstep.

If you recall, the CAP identified five priority areas: 1.Community Life; 2.Outdoors & Nature; 3 Organising Ourselves; 4. Getting About and 5. Our Homes. Action groups were set up to drive each one and you will see in a separate report in this newsletter, the progress that is being made in these areas.

Although the Community Action Plan identified priorities and illustrated how they might impact on individuals' lives, it stopped short of producing what in the jargon are called 'spatial plans.' These will illustrate how each settlement in the area (and the area as a whole) will look and function once the Plan has been implemented.

For example: Affordable community-

owned homes - where should they be built? Local community hubs, recreational facilities, and playparks where are the gaps that need to be filled? After-school / nursery care – where should it happen? Walking and cycling networks - which routes should be the primary focus? Bettercommunity transport to schools, community hubs etc., what needs to happen, and where?

Stratherrick & Foyers has been divided into six settlements and these are: Foyers, Torness, Whitebridge, Gorthleck, Errogie and Inverfarigaig. Nick and his team will ask residents in each of these areas what specifically they want to see happen in their immediate area.

The aim is to:

- Help the local community explore and understand how 'their place' will look in the future once the Community Action Plan has been implemented.
- Engage community groups, public sector organisations, businesses, and landowners to incorporate their existing work and influence their future activity, where it contributes to the Community Action Plan action priorities.
- Inform where future Community Action Plan investments and improvements should take place
- Prepare a Local Place Plan document which can be shared with

the public sector to guide and influence their local planning and service delivery in the community's interests.

Technically, the data produced will be mapped spatially as digital layers on a Geographic Information System, which can then be combined, analysed and printed at different scales and styles for use in many different ways e.g., influencing Highland Council's local plans for housing, roads etc.

It will also help to drive the priorities for the community benefit fund spending decisions.

The Community Action Plan was prepared when the COVID lockdown was at its height. Much of the engagement necessarily had to take place online. The changed circumstances mean that there is now an opportunity to shift the primary emphasis of engagement from online to face-to-face, with the website there as a supporting resource.

The intention is to have the spatial plan completed in January 2023. Please keep an eye out for the consultation event in your area, the dates (it will be sometime in November) will be published in the monthly newsletter, on the Trust website and Facebook.

BOARD REPORT

The Stratherrick and Foyers Board met on Wednesday 3rd August for a two and a half hour meeting.

Gareth Jones formally let the meeting know he had agreed to become Chair and wished Kirsty Balfour well for her upcoming pregnancy. Mark Sutherland took on the lead Director for Riverside Field project.

Maire Brown was co-opted back on to the committee and a general discussion took place about recruitment of Community Directors. Board Members are hoping to make the role more strategic, leaving some current actions to be supported by staff, and how better to support new Board Members of all ages.

The Trust Manager reported how he intended to monitor the work of the staff and report back to the Board.

Student Grants were awarded to Vaugh Devlin and Justin Sharp. A nonconstituted grant was awarded to Alison Randall for Bowling for All and the Community Council decision would be by email. The Board were pleased to see the results of the work on the Wade Bridge.

Business included how the Trust could support the Trustees of the Stratherrick Public Hall to ensure they could make an informed decision about the future of the Hall and what would be required of community funding in the future.

SSE have informed the Trust that we share a policy with them on supporting individuals during the cost of living crisis. Once agreed we can support individuals with grants of up to £250 (£500 per household) on food and fuel over two winters. We will have discussions with SSE about the Boards suggested approach, using recognised local organisation to distribute the funds.

The board agreed to a subtle change to our legacy investment strategy following a review by the legacy fund sub-committee. The discussion has led to our investment advisors, Clarendon, recommending investments which could lead to a better return. Thanks went to Ken Sinclair and Maureen McGuire for their work on this.

Through the Action Groups and from the Board there is general support for the second stage of the Community Action Plan. Nick Wright and his team will visit the recognised settlements in the area, Torness, Foyers etc. to discuss where suggestions from the Community Action Plan should go. This information will be provided to the Community Council and the Local Authority for their Local Development Plan. Work already done by community members through the CAP Action Groups will continue and feed into this work.

Ken reported on meetings he and Kirsty had with some of the immediate residents to Riverside Field which helped to answer some of their questions. A commitment was also made to keep them as informed as possible as the project gathers pace.

The AGM is fast approaching and any recommendations for changes to the constitution will come or can be suggested by the Board. Our fundraisers, working with outside groups, have suggested some changes that would be required to get external funding and staff will look at this and make recommendations as part of the Governance Review.

Dates will shortly be set for future events such as the Fireworks Evening and Winter Wonderland. A date will also be set for the Highland Gathering. It was recognised this year's Gathering was planned in only five months. A lessons learnt meeting will be held on August 18th.

The Trust will be holding 'thank-you' evening in the Wildside Centre on 18th August for those people who worked and volunteered above and beyond the call of duty for events such as Winter Wonderland, Jubilee and the Highland Gathering. Treat this as an invitation!

The work put in by community volunteers was recognised and thanked by the Board.

CAP

This article summarises what has happened since our last Community Action Groups. You will recall that the Community Action Plan developed last year grouped the changes the community would like to see into the following areas:

COMMUNITY LIFE

RETAIN POST OFFICE & SHOP -There is interest in this and the Trust has



identified funding that COMMUNITY LIFE could be utilised for the groups that are picking up this project.

AFTER-SCHOOL / NURSERY CARE IN THE LOCAL COMMUNITY - Following our second action group, a number of parents/carers and stakeholders are to meet to action suggestions from the group

LOCAL COMMUNITY HUBS Wildside Centre:

We have identified land for expansion of the outdoor facilities at Wildside and, once test digs have been completed, will purchase from the Local Authority which is preparing the legal papers

Errogie Kirk:

The consultation and design of the build are coming to the final stages and planning will follow. Wind and watertight work has been delayed due to a bat survey having to be undertaken meaning Phase 1 and 2 are likely to be run together. We are preparing for a draw down on SSE money but are actively working with the team and Heritage Group on funding applications.

Stratherrick Public Hall

The Trust has agreed with the trustees to appoint a surveyor to provide advice and indicative costs in the following three areas: How best to remove the mould and spores and make it a safe building to use; Decide what restoration work is required to return the interior of the building to its original state; Review the general state of the building and, working with the Trustees, decide what improvements are required to realise their long-term vision

FOYERS SPORTS FACILITIES (RIVERSIDE FIELD AND BAY) The Bay is in planning and we are responding to consultations. Latest

Riverside Field - 'planning-in-principle' has been granted and we are approaching people for the steering group. A planning application is in which will determine some of the conditions of planning in principle and then we can start having meaningful conversations with stakeholders about the next stage of the development. The Trust will work with a residents group that has been formed to feed their views into the detailed design of the project. Latest updates can be found here:

OUTDOORS AND NATURE PLAYPARKS

We have established what support is available from the local authority on playpark development and

management of the playparks with an idea to develop one at Wildside. Parents/Carers/Children will be consulted on next steps

Graeme Ambrose and Nick Wright did some work on paths and the action from the most recent meeting is to get a team of volunteers together to implement them.

Graeme Ambrose has suggested an audit of the existing paths which would then enable prioritisation of paths for investment and development. Nick Wright has done some preliminary work on map paths we have using Strava walking data. challenging issues that must be addressed. Rob and Tony are persevering and recommendations will be brought back to the Trust. Discussions are also ongoing with the schools. School minibuses aren't used for summer holidays (e.g., Millburn Academy has 2 minibuses which are parked up all summer) and might offer the opportunity for a trial, to test demand.

OUR HOMES

Community Housing trust have planning and funding to build homes in Inverfarigaig. The Trust plans to do trial pits, costs approx. £4000, at Wildside OUR HOMES for a proposed land purchase at a cost of £27,000

The Communities Housing Trust will charge approximately £3,000 to carry out a Housing Needs Assessment. This could include a guestion for local landowners to understand whether they have land or buildings which could be used. Funding is being sought from the Scottish Land Fund and a Rural

Housing Grant.

Inverfarigaig Forest School There are two potential land acquisitions under discussion in Inverfarigaig. SFCT has agreed to purchase land on behalf of a local community group. Residents are also keen to progress the purchase of the forest school and the adjoining land.
