CHAIR REPORT

As we approach the Trust's AGM, the bulletin this month takes the form of an annual report detailing the activities of the 12 months from July 2022 to June 2023. It is important to note that what follows is not 'what the Trust has done' - but is what staff and volunteers have achieved with the support of community benefit funding.

The Trust's overall strategy has five phases: 1. Stabilize the Board and its governance; 2. Professionalise the service; 3 Put in place the infrastructure. These steps are now pretty well complete. We are now in the final two phases: Stimulate and support many small projects that will make a real difference to people's lives and achieve a high level of self-sufficiency by 2030. Below are some of the highlights of the last 12 months.

- The year began with a successful Highland Gathering with over 500 people attending the event at Corriegarth. On the back of the event a Highland Dancing Class for children began at the Wildside. We also supported the Fireworks and Winter Wonderland at which over 100 children were given presents from Santa. Winter Wonderland received a 9.1 out of 10 from those who attended.
- Thanks to Scottish Government and Development Trust Association of Scotland (DTAS) funding we recruited a Marketing and PR Officer (job share with Jillian Barclay and Calum Martin) and a Community Action Plan Officer (Robbie Burn). To improve our financial support we split the role of Bookkeeper (Susan Low) and Finance Officer (Fiona Mustarde). This will be Laura's final AGM after 7 years with us and she was replaced by Kirsteen Campbell.
- Matthew Rhodes joined us as our new Buildings and Facilities Officer and Peter Leyden as the Cleaner for Foyers Toilets.
- We completed a Housing Needs Analysis and are currently investigating the site at Inverfarigaig for affordable homes to rent. We also advised on funding available for self build homes.
- The Foyers toilets were built and are currently operational near Foyers Stores.
- We distributed £18500 of grants for food and fuel via the Knockie Trust, supported local business events and food for social interaction during the winter, distributed 80 tonnes of wood fuel, held regular Warm Wednesdays, larder, clothes swap, bring and buy and food sales at the Wildside. A support group was also started at the Wildside.
- We conducted and completed our Community Place Plan one year before the deadline to the local authority which will support funding applications and working with the local authority on the needs of our community. This was submitted by the Community Council. This was validated by the Local Authority and is the first Place Plan to be submitted (and second in Scotland).
- The Stratherrick Hall reopened after repairs to the roof. This is one of several groups who receive grants from the Trust alongside individuals for study and sport grants.

- The new Bowling Club started at the Wildside Centre and was so successful ended up moving into Stratherrick Hall too, as did Pilates.
- The Pulse Survey was conducted with a staggering 22% improvement in Communications from the Trust. This survey happens every year and will guide us where to put our resources to support you. We also improved our What's On calendar and share that weekly on social media.
- Thanks to external funding two polycrubs were installed at Wildside and Inverfarigaig for community growing programmes.
- We held our first Success Night at the Wildside where all groups could announce what they had achieved this year. Over 30 people attended the event which was very enjoyable and we learnt about what everyone was up to.
- There was a Falls of Foyers task day and a community clean up, both funded in part by the Trust.
- The Chairs of CC and SFCT have approached SSE for a discussion on wind farm investment and this is likely to happen before the end of 2023.
- Following the Community Action Plan and work by parents/carers and staff at SFCT CALA have indicated that they may provide after school care at Stratherrick and Foyers Primary School, with initial support from the Trust, to help support and encourage families to the area. A fully funded childminder role was also advertised in the local area thanks to the work of our staff members.
- New lighting has been installed at Wildside to benefit the groups there who requested it. We are starting to work with DTAS Facilities Management Service to ensure all our buildings meet standards and address any issues community members may have re energy, insurance, maintenance, fire safety, health and safety, licencing, capital projects, procurement, risk management and business continuity.
- The land at Wildside has been purchased for housing/ development if required. We have informed local residents we now own the land and hope to improve the environment there following an independent risk assessment.
- The Park at Wildside has been given planning permission and £20,000 has been raised towards its development. Building will start in March 2024.
- Errogie Phase 1 wind and watertight (and protection of bats) has been completed and our planning application for Phase 2 was approved at the end of October. We have a funded project with Accelerate to review the Business Plan for Phase 2 and a funding bid to strengthen that.
- The Slipway at Foyers was awarded planning, the QS has arranged the tenders and will work on a transport plan. The area was tidied up at the Loch to allow easier access at the moment.
- The land at Inverfarigaig was purchased for the local residents who will agree a lease from the Trust.
- We have started the process of a community asset transfer from Forestry for the Forest School at Inverfarigaig. This is going through consultation now.
- We were given Planning In Principle for the Riverside Field Project and set up the Community Liaison Group. The residents recently met twice to discuss and agree the landscaping as part of Phase 1 (to then be shared with the wider community) and we have initiated work to meet planning conditions.
- The Pathways Group conducted a scoping report to assess and establish the cost of what work needs to be done.

COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN OUTCOMES

WILDSIDE (See below)

Matt and Robbie have made fantastic progress on the polycrub at the Wildside Centre over the last couple of weeks! RIVERSIDE

All Planning In Principle condition documents have been completed and the local residents will hopefully sign off their landscape design for consultation with the wider community before the end of the year.

PATHWAYS

Project activity to date has focussed on two sections of the South Loch Ness Trail. £20K of funding was awarded by Highland Council to the group and together with funding of £20K from the Trust, we have been working to finalise how exactly the funds will be spent. It has taken a number of twists and turns as all projects do, but as of September 2023, work is expected to commence soon on improvements between Whitebridge and Foyers while at the same time we are in talks with Forestry and Land Scotland to collaborate on improvements between Inverfarigaig and Foyers.

AFTER SCHOOL CARE

We are waiting for one further piece of information from the Highland Council for After School Care, and we were informed this week that we should receive this in November. We hope to have this in place for the next academic year.

COMMUNITY TRANSPORT


Funding applications went in this week to assist with the provision of a community minibus and the purchase of e-bikes. We will update you on further progress on both of these in due course.


ERROGIE (See below)

COMMUNITY HOUSING


We are currently discussing with Community Housing Trust opportunities in the development at Inverfarigaig. We will keep you posted on that.

FOREST SCHOOL

An approach has been made for a Community Asset Transfer of the Forest School at Inverfarigaig. This and all our plans were recently covered in the Press and Journal.

PLAYPARKS (See right)

Following consultation on the Wildside Centre PlayPark design we have agreed the company to take it forward, with an expectation this will be built from March next year.



SFCT ANNUAL ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

The annual accounts for the year ended show an increase in profit from 2021/22 of 27% and a 16% increase in net assets on the balance sheet. Our staff enabled and supported the successful delivery of large-scale projects such as the Foyers Toilets and Errogie Church redevelopments, with the Trust receiving more than £240k in external project funding during the year. We strengthened our finance team as we move to funding larger projects and our fundraisers continue to help raise the additional funds required to meet the objectives set by the community in the Community Action Plan and Place Plan. We are now working on a £6million

campaign to ensure all current capital projects are complete by 2030.

To better understand the activity and achievements during the year, it is more helpful to consider this in the context of cash outflow and inflow. In cash terms, Foyers Toilets and Errogie Church combined accounted for 50% of cash outflow, grants and initiatives were 18%, staff costs accounted for 13%, investment into the legacy fund was 11% and the remainder was administration and overhead costs.

The legacy fund investment will provide an income to the Trust and the Community beyond the lifetime of the windfarms. The current value of this fund as of November 2023 is £1,090,340. Stock market investments can be volatile but these investments are designed for long term financial planning.

PLACE PLAN NEXT STEPS

This week we engaged with the local authority on next steps for the Community Action Plan and Place Plan and how they can help make things happen in the local area. This helps us pool our strengths and resources – what they can help with in their statutory work and budgets and what the Trust (Community Council and other groups) can bring to the table in terms of resources, community view, community volunteering, staff time and funding both internal and external. What does that mean in totality? It means we can work towards the outcomes we all want, doubling our resources by working proactively together.



WHAT WE ARE WORKING ON

This week we went a step closer to community transport, affordable housing, after school care, pathways, land use, playparks and Winter Wonderland! Sometimes its two steps forward and one step back but we are working on many of the initiatives that you identified in the Community Action Plan and Place Plan. We have gone from not much is happening to everything seems to be happening at once! It doesn't and won't, of course, but we are aiming for a 2030 deadline for most projects.

THE PULSE SURVEY

You help guide us and community groups and where to direct our resources to make things happen. You help to do this via filling out the annual Pulse Survey from the 5th November for two weeks. NEW COMMUNITY VAN

Have you seen this mystery white van?

Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust has taken delivery of our new community van. The plan is to use it around Stratherrick and Foyers to help the Trust, local community groups and residents alike. Whether it's chairs, bouncy castles or even tea urns, moving our assets around is essential to get the best use from them.

Trust Director Gareth Jones said 'The Trust Board decided to trial a van because there is often a need to transport bulky objects around the district for events either at the Wildside Centre or the Hall. We also have the slipway site in development at Loch Ness and the conversion of the former Free Church building at Errogie. The van is insured for two members of Trust staff to drive. No Trust directors are able to drive the van.

Tony Foster, CEO at the Trust added, 'The Trust will also be making the van available to help other community groups when they need it.

Once we are in the position to take bookings for the use of the van, we will issue some more info'.

'TAKE THE PULSE' SURVEY
