

IN MEMORIAM

KIT CAMERON 25TH JULY 1953 - 5TH SEPTEMBER 2024

Kit was a cornerstone of Boleskine Community Care, a true force for good, and someone whose life was dedicated to helping others. Her commitment to the charity and to the people of our community will leave a lasting legacy.

Coming from a lifelong background in care, Kit's desire to help others was at the heart of everything she did. She brought with her a wealth of experience. knowledge, and a deep understanding of what it truly means to care for others. Her mission was simple but powerful: to ensure that evervone in our community could live a fulfilled life, surrounded by dignity, compassion, and the support they deserved.

Kit believed in caring for people "from the womb to the tomb" and saw care as more than meeting physical needs — it was about nurturing the body, mind, and spirit. She was dedicated to keeping people active, engaged, and connected, always striving to

prevent isolation and loneliness. Her efforts ensured that no one in our community felt forgotten or unsupported, regardless of their age or circumstance.

One of Kit's greatest contributions was her tireless work to enable people to receive care at home, where they felt most comfortable. She knew how distressing hospital stays could be for many and worked passionately to provide an alternative. Kit believed that everyone deserved the chance to live out their days with dignity and comfort, and her efforts helped countless people avoid unnecessary hospital stays, promoting a higher quality of life at home.

Beyond her work with care at home. Kit also championed the importance of physical fitness and wellbeing. She was the driving force behind the weekly Moovin' Aboot activity class at the Hub. which was always well attended. Kit's enthusiasm and energy shone through in these classes, where she encouraged people of all abilities to stay active, healthy, and engaged. She knew that regular physical activity was crucial not just for physical health, but for





mental well-being and social connection. Through Moovin' Aboot, she created a space where the community could come together, stay fit, and have fun in a welcoming, supportive environment.

Kit's unwavering dedication to care, her passion for helping others, and her belief in promoting active, fulfilled lives have left an indelible mark on Boleskine Community Care. Her legacy will continue to inspire us all as we carry forward her vision of a compassionate, connected, and dignified community for all

DR BENNET

We were sad to hear of the passing of Dr. Bennet, peacefully, at home, in the presence of his family, on 2nd July 2024. Arthur John Bennet, aged 94 years, lived in Farr and was the local doctor at Foyers Medical Practice for many years. Much loved husband of Ishbel, devoted father to Hamish, William, Flora, Elizabeth and Finlay, and a dear grandfather and great grand-father.

REV. JIM CHRISTIE 1936 - 2024

It seems like no time ago that Jim and Ann Christie were living in the manse at Foyers, but it is alarming to realise that it is 21 years since Jim retired from being the Church of Scotland minister for Foyers, Boleskine and Dores.

Jim had trained to be a minister later in life having worked in Licensing in the Legal Departments of the council in Aberdeen, Peterhead and Banff... an East coast man born and bred. It was only in his late 40s that he felt called to become a minister and so he went to train at Aberdeen University. It was then that Jim and Ann found themselves moving to Foyers and the Strath.

They arrived in Foyers one snowy day in January, whilst there were still workmen finishing off the work being done on the house. There was no time to waste, having arrived on the Wednesday, Jim was taking a funeral on the Saturday. This was to be a mark of his time in the parish, he would quietly be there for those in trouble or distress


Jim loved the parish, both the people and the place, and would often say that 'Nowhere could be better.' He particularly appreciated having Donald MacKintosh as Session Clerk and would say that 'Donald was the best Session Clerk he could possibly have... he always kept Jim up to date.'

On Sundays he would be at Boleskine Church and Dores in the morning and in the evening he would be taking the service at Fovers. One of the highlights of his week would be going into the schools, Stratherrick, Foyers and Aldourie, each week, Even though he saw the local children so regularly, either at school or at church on Sunday morning where there was a good number of children there, the children

never recognised him when he was Santa at the schools, dressing up at home and walking up to Foyers school ringing the bell as he went. However closely the children looked they could not work out who was in the Santa costume... he even managed without his glasses to make sure they didn't recognise him!

One of his claims to fame was that he was at Grampian Television for a week taking the daily Reflections. Even here it was local illustrations that he used each day, the Aluminium Factory, Flower Festival and shinty. Jim also took time to be involved with Cameron House and for 14 years would take services there regularly and visited.

Jim was a man of quiet yet deep and sincere faith in Jesus, he and Ann cherished their time with the people of the parish.

RECOLLECTIONS

Having progressed from being one of the youngest residents in our community to a more senior status I think it might be worthwhile to set down a few recollections particularly in light of several recent local controversies.

In the early 1970's I found myself Chairman of the Community Council at the time of the very first local plan by the then County Council and planning authority for the area. Foyers Aluminium factory had just closed down but fortuitously many former employees found jobs in the oil industry at Ardersier, Nigg and Kishorn or on the Loch Mhor pump storage hydro scheme and also moved to existing and new housing developments in Smithton and Inverness.

However, there was a strong feeling that some new heavy industry should take the place in the redundant aluminium factory at Foyers but the draft local plan showed tourism as being the preferred land use. We debated this thoroughly in the Community Council to the extent that the two Foyers representatives felt that they had to tender their resignations as we could not convincingly campaign for a replacement to the aluminium factory or see any other realistic land use on the horizon. This was a bit of a shock to me as a new and first time Community Council chairperson!

We then noticed that the Highlands and Islands Development Board were promoting new light industrial starter units in places like Muir of Ord and Ardersier so I wrote to the then chairman asking whether Foyers might also have one of these and feature on the programme. This was successful and we duly got two units which after various tenants have now been amalgamated to form the current BCC hub.

After a rest from local politics I once again found myself chair of the Community Council when along came the planning application for the caravan and camping site at Loch Ness

Shores in lower Foyers. Subsequently a strong campaign against the development arose in Lower Foyers and unfortunately some elderly residents were told that they wouldn't be safe in their beds at night from all night parties and gangs of roving Hells Angels! (In fact, most caravan and campsite users are quiet living middle aged individuals or families, and from my experience in the past around such matters (during my work) is that such disturbances are most unlikely.

So, we organised a site meeting with all of the Community Council members at which the applicant showed us around the development site and explained fully what was proposed. 14 main points of concern were listed, and each one thoroughly examined from roads and traffic, sewage disposal, and proximity to existing houses. On roads and traffic we had to accept the Planning Authority's experts view that the carrying capacity and sewerage was adequate for the envisaged use. Despite personally being waylaid and verbally attacked for having the temerity to make a site visit and ask the applicant to explain what was proposed we didn't oppose the application but did make several points about screening and management.

The demolition of Errogie Smiddy.

From my place on the Community Council I was involved in setting up the Community Trust and negotiating benefit payments first as Chair then as Secretary and was the first part-time paid employee!

This has come to mind after the recent debacle over transporting replacement turbine blades to Dunmaglass. Incidentally the estate owner Sir Jack Hayward (one of the 10 wealthiest men in the country) insisted he didn't need planning permission for the first turbine erected on Ben Dubhcoire and Highland Council backed down when he proclaimed he would fight them all the way to the House of Lords. But then the great enforcement officer in the sky stepped in with a lightning bolt which hit the turbine ran down the

power line and blew up the substation on the Cail an Odhar. It happened on one day in early April and I saw it all from the kitchen window.

Anyway, the Coire Garth wind farm developers North British Wind Power couldn't get their vehicles around the 90 degree corner at Errogie. The Smiddy house and outbuildings were owned by the late Marie Greenaway, her husband the novelist Peter Greenaway having passed away some years earlier. The building was not in good repair and the solid fuel rayburn (her main heat source) was seriously affecting her health.

After the developers had failed in their attempt to buy land on the other side of her house (reputably an offer of a six figure sum was made) they then gave Marie £500 and an annual subscription to a magazine to take away half of her front garden for a road widening which would allow vehicle access to their multi million pound development on Coire Garth estate. Having known the Greenaways since their arrival in Errogie I then stepped in on behalf of the Community Trust and also by then as a Director of the Highland Small Communities Housing Trust to promote a deal where Marie would give up her property in exchange for one of two brand new sheltered houses rent free for the rest of her days on the site of her old home and the Community Trust would manage the other dwelling to meet the local demand for affordable housing. Demolition and removal of the smiddy would then allow Highland Council to affect a total realignment of the bend.

Unfortunately, Marie's health continued to deteriorate and after a last winter in my great aunt's house less than a mile away she had to move to a home in Inverness where she subsequently passed away. Highland Council then acquired the site, demolished the house and outbuildings and carried out the road improvement as you see it today. This was not before bats were discovered in the structure and led to the construction of a brand new bat shed on the other side of the road although

whether any of these pampered critters have ever taken up residence there instead of flitting to a neighbouring structure or tree is another matter.

Housing is still the number one priority for the Trust in our area and plans were drawn up for the two small semi detached houses on what was left of the smiddy site and while there is a movement by the Bio Diversity group to grow wild flowers on the cleared site there is still an urgent need for more local housing and at the very least the historic location of the last smiddy and local meeting place in Errogie should be recorded.

And in the future....

Finally, with plentiful funds and opportunities to acquire new Community premises we seemed to have missed out a strategic appraisal of where these should be best located to meet the needs of our Community and sometimes seem to be playing catch up after a commitment has been made. Should the expenditure be best targeted to Gorthleck, Wildside, or Inverfarigaig or Foyers and has anyone factored in the practicality and cost of the necessary commitment to maintenance and management?


My other concern is the perhaps too frequent use of the homely and comfortable word "Community". Do we really understand what that means in the 21st. century and as applied to the needs and requirements of our widely dispersed area, age demographic and social interactions and I don't mean the sometimes wildly ambitious post-it ideas which can blossom in consultation events!

These are all problems which will meet the Trust's new Chief Executive who hopefully will choose to live within or in, at least in close proximity to our area and come with a good familiarity with the Highlands and our way of life.

The Tearoom interior is always a big hit with visitors who love the wood burning stove and the local shinty and tug of war photos. The antler chandeliers are also a big talking point!

MOTEH PARROTT

The Stones Are Merely Sleeping – The debut album from local musician Moteh Parrott was released on the 6th Sept with thanks to an outstanding response to his Kickstarter campaign.

You may have read the short piece that we released back in August, where we highlighted the news about Moteh's up-coming album and a campaign he had setup online to help bring the album to life. Without the support of the Kickstarter campaign, the album may have taken much longer to be released. Luckily Moteh's loyal following helped him surpass his target, there was never any doubt.

Since its release in early Sept, the album has received much love and admiration far and wide. The Stones Are Merely Sleeping can be likened to concept albums – alongside



upbeat anthemic songs, the track list includes interludes and poetry which explore overarching themes of loss, relationships and wider spiritual questions.

The album's title comes from a poem Moteh wrote while kayaking on Loch Mhor, in the Highlands, which he includes in the track Seven Generations. Written on a clear, sunny morning one New Year's Day with the hills, trees and sky perfectly inverted in the water's reflection, he found inspiration to express an overwhelming feeling of connection. With this idea present throughout his music, it was the natural title to encompass and unify the tracklist for the album.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

AGM – the AGM took place in June. We have a full quota of members at the moment and very much appreciate all of their volunteer time. The office bearers and members are –



Planning applications – the Community Council has been extremely busy with many planning applications for energy schemes and the associated connections to the national grid in the area. The members continue to listen to members of the community and their concerns over the cumulative effect of so many schemes and the effects on the roads and the environment amongst many things. Below is a map of current wind farms and others that are planned. On top of this, there are three pump storage hydro schemes, one with planning (Loch Na Cathrach, above Dores) and two at different stages of the planning system -Loch Kemp (Dell Estate, Whitebridge) and

Glen Earrach (on the North side of Loch Ness opposite Foyers). We are in contact with many other community councils areas that are also affected to help strengthen small communities' voices



Roads – We had Colin Ross at our meeting in August 24. Colin is Senior Roads Engineer with Highland Council (HC). The full discussion can be read in the minutes but some of the headlines are –

Budget – the budget that HC get for road improvements has been dramatically reduced and less money coming from timber extraction works. Other road improvements have been financed by mitigation payments agreed by energy schemes etc.

Urban looking village improvement schemes - road environment is the biggest single factor in drivers speed and some semiurbanisation required to reduce speeds in rural areas when travelling through villages/settlements.

Village speed restrictions – all villages that were a 40mph will be changing to a 30mph. Full signage should be in place soon.

Agreement made that the Community Council would compile a list of concerns and comments and liaise with HC to get these remedied. Micro grants – the community council have a small yearly fund from SSE renewables that is for micro grants that any individual or group can apply for so long as it is for community benefit in the Stratherrick and Foyers area. NEW COMMUNITY & CULTURE GROUP AT ERROGIE CHURCH!

The Gathering Place (Errogie Church); update from the Community & Culture Group – for the community, by the community.

The Community & Culture Steering Group is a group of community members passionate about driving the development and use of The Gathering Place (Errogie Church) forward. This includes consulting the local community, planning social events, and liaising with the Trust. We want Errogie Church to be used as an extension to everyone's living room: somewhere locals can meet up, chat, and use recreational and leisure facilities. We are also working with the Boleskine Biodiversity Group and The South Loch Ness Heritage Group to specify how the building can support them with educational & exhibition facilities. Our primary aim is to translate what the local community wants into a reality for everyone to enjoy.

We recently held the first of a series of focus groups, involving members of the local community, who shared their views on what they would like to see happening in the church. This included a discussion about the basic facilities that will be required whilst funding is raised to pay for Phase II of the building. We would like to be able to provide equipment and events that are different from the other community hubs in the area, as well as some similar facilities if they are popular, and the demand is high in the local community.

At the focus group, we captured everyone's ideas with post-its on the wall and then discussed the ideas in more detail. Another focus group session (disguised as a community lunch) was held in mid-October. We are busy pulling together the survey results gathered on the day and online; once these are collated, we will share with the community





and start working towards providing facilities/events, starting with the most popular, and what is possible with the current facilities in the building. The results of the survey will be fed into an application to the Trust for funds to develop the basic facilities required to make it more usable, improve safety, buy equipment, and support social activities. We know already that basic facilities will be of top priority and the Trust is also aware of this.

BOLESKINE BIODIVERSITY GROUP

The Biodiversity Group has been looking after the small meadow at Errogie Corner over the last year in the hope of creating a small wildflower meadow. The aim has been to halt the regular cutting of the grass and to try to support a flourishing wildflower habitat. Wildflower meadows are vital for supporting local biodiversity. They attract pollinators like bees and butterflies, add seasonal beauty, and offer education and recreation opportunities.

This autumn we have removed the thistles and other non-native species and given the site a cut so that it is ready for the scattering of vellow rattle which helps to break the soil down. Now the cut grass has been removed by the work party, we were lucky with the weather! We are now in a good position to sow native wildflower seeds which we will aim to purchase from Scotia Seeds, thanks to funding from the Nature Restoration Grant

Community involvement from the Group in managing the meadow has fostered local support for nature and we have a growing group of community members and a number of small projects in the pipeline.

More recently we have now become a constituted group and having merged with Boleskine Environmental Network (BEN) we are now called the Boleskine Biodiversity Group.

This project has enabled us to make small steps towards nature support and habitat management in our community and we will soon be back to removing sitka spruce at the Ault na Goire site now the bird nesting season has finished.

Our AGM will be held in November at the Wildside Centre and we are aiming to hold additional talks over the winter so please keep an eye out for events organised by the Boleskine Biodiversity Group.

S.O.S. SAVE OUR SWIFTS!

Despite the dismal weather, the South Loch Ness Swift Project got off to a very promising start this year.

We have established that there are at least three active colonies in the project area: one each in Errogie, Boleskine and Foyers. There may be others, if you know of any, please get in touch.

These charismatic birds have attracted a lot of interest in the strath, but they are surprisingly difficult to study and monitor. Few people have ever seen a swift except in flight, and fewer still have seen them on the nest so we are planning to install webcams on some nests.

The biggest colony (in Errogie) had at least 6 occupied nesting cavities this year.

Temporary wooden nest-boxes were installed at the old Free Presbyterian church in Errogie and within only a few days, prospecting swifts were showing a lot of interest. Some even entered the boxes and tried them out for size!

Following a talk at the church and a small stand at the gathering in Corriegarth, several house-holders have come forward to offer to host swifts in their house next year. We are currently applying for funding to purchase materials to make nest-boxes, and to install 'callers' (small speakers which attract prospecting bids).

We plan to run a workshop making nest boxes ready to install in the spring.

PATHWAYS GROUP

Since early spring the Pathways Group has continued to make good progress with all streams of activity.

First, following the improvements to the South Loch Ness Trail (SLNT) between Inverfarigaig and Foyers, improvements between Whitebridge and Fovers were completed by the end of March. Both stream crossings are now much easier with the bedding into the streams of large flat stones. We can't guarantee that you won't still get wet feet crossing but it's no longer a balancing act to stay upright!

Installation of the people/bike counters on the SLNT at Suidhe and Inverfarigaig followed on quickly and were in place by early May. These provide valuable information on trail usage which will help determine future investment requirements and will also assist with any funding applications. The initial data indicates much higher usage than we anticipated between May 15th -September 10th, 100 bikes and 484 people were recorded at the Suidhe counter and 48 bikes and 1048 people at Inverfarigaig.

At the same time as the counters were being

installed, the Group's thoughts moved to the development of a pathways based community app, one which seeks to not only bring benefits to the wellbeing and health of those who live in our community but which also helps to make tourism in the area more sustainable. In May, with the backing of the Trust Board, the Pathways Group employed the services of Zudu, an app developer, to map out what the app might 'look like', its functions and the potential cost of developing it. This was well received recently by the Trust Board and the Group now intend to bring plans for the app development out to the wider community at a meeting in mid-November - date thc.

If in due course an app is developed, one key factor in the success of the app will have a good marketing strategy up and running before the app is launched. In this respect the Group are already well placed with the continued development of the Walk the Walk marketing campaign, started in 2023 to encourage more local people to experience our many local walks. The Group has now recorded 17 walks which are free to download from the Trust website. The Group, working with the Trust Comms team, are also now collecting valuable data from QR codes on the Walk the Walk posters spread throughout the area. Finally, we are also working with the Comms team to make short videos of some of the walks to not only show what they have to offer but also to spread path usage beyond the SLNT.

So once again, a lot has happened over the past few months and a lot more looks likely to happen in the coming months and for this a big thank you to all involved!

SOUTH LOCH NESS HERITAGE GROUP

On Thursday the 18th of April 2024 at Stratherrick Public Hall, the South Loch Ness Heritage Group held its spring talk "History of Inverness Hospitals" with the speaker being Steve Leslie. Before an enthralled audience of around forty people, Steve, who is a

Consultant Cardiologist at Raigmore Hospital, and coauthor (along with his father Jim) of the book The Hospitals of Inverness, took us on a virtual road trip across the highlands describing medical facilities from the 1850's till the present day. Steve told us of Fever Hospitals, Cottage Hospitals, Maternity hospitals, Military Hospitals, Asylums and Sanatoriums, illustrated with photos of some of them and highlighted important design features of attributed to different types of hospitals. Steve went on to give a brief history of the medical facilities in our area, with the coming of the British Aluminium Company which provided

funding in the late 1890's to bring a doctor to Foyers.

Steve recounted the different types of facilities for medical assistance that existed in Inverness and mentioned the Inverness city walking audio tour of them. The tour is available at www.geotourist.com and

The South Loch Ness Heritage Group had a marquee at this year's Highland Gathering held at Corriegarth Estate in July. Visitors to the marquee could view the numerous display boards depicting local scenes, events, farming, game keeping, local Industries and people from former times.

There were also display books featuring individual local topics. The Marquee was staffed by heritage volunteers who were on hand at all times to answer questions that arose from the displays as well as any other local heritage topic.

There was also a Mystery Object Quiz and the answers were:

- Bee smoker.
- 2. Making lead shot.
- 3. Knife with different -sized blades for bleeding a sick animal.
- 4. Filling water to rear tyres of a tractor.
- 5. Punching the septum for bull's nose ring.
- 6. Old saw set.
- 7. Another type of saw set.
- 8. For stoning cherries / extracting juice.
- 9. A cannula probe for e.g. a bloated cow.
- 10. Nut/ bolt splitter.

The winner of the £10 book token was Corran Gardiner from South Laggan, Invergarry.



The South Loch Ness Heritage Group had their summer event on Saturday 24th August "The Bona Fide Traveller Walk" between Whitebridge and Fovers. Prior to the walk we had a talk at the Wildside Centre on all the places that we would pass on the walk, giving the history, etc of each place. The speakers were Fiona Larg, Bob Main, Janet Sutherland, Morag MacNeil, Allan Macdonald & Alister Chisholm. Following the talk at Wildside, the twenty seven walkers then proceeded to walk down to Fovers via Dell Estate. The heavy rain in the morning had stopped and it was a light drizzle when we started off. The weather was kind to us during the walk, with most folk casting off their waterproofs very quickly as we progressed and the sun appeared. At various points in the walk we stopped to point out places that had been mentioned in the talk

and had a further discussion about them. On reaching Foyers some of the walkers retired for lunch at Camerons, then there were lifts arranged back to the Wildside Centre, whilst the more seasoned walkers walked back.

Footnote: The summer event walk title came from the tradition that prior to 1962 in Scotland, only hotels were allowed to sell alcohol on a Sunday. Then only if the customer was deemed to be a Bone Fide Traveller, who had travelled at least 3 miles from his home address. So people from Foyers would walk the 3 odd miles up to Whitebridge via Dell Estate, to quench their thirst at the Whitebridge Hotel. The ones from Whitebridge would do the same, in the opposite direction to the Foyers Hotel.

GRANITE MILESTONE UNCOVERED

In Inverfarigaig there's been a rediscovery of a granite milestone on the old military road. The milestone features on old OS map of the area and has been part of the streetscape for perhaps 200 years. Although faded now, it reads: 'Foyers Inn 2' and 'Dores 8 ½'. The milestone was also an Ordnance Survey bench mark giving a height of 138.8ft. The milestone was rediscovered in March this year and contractors working in the village kindly restored the milestone to an upright position once more.

AUTUMN RECIPES

SLOW COOKED BEEF STEW

Diced beef
Carrots
Neep
Potatoes
Beef oxo cube
Plain flour or Corn flour to thicken
Fresh crusty bread



In a slow cooker, an oven proof dish or a Rayburn proof pot, brown some diced beef (shoulder or chuck are good cuts for this) and add your chopped carrots and neep. Fry for a minute and then add water and 1x oxo cube. Bring to the boil, then add the potatoes, boil for another five minutes. Mix the flour or corn flour with water and add to the stew, put in the oven or if using the slow cooker simply put everything in and leave it on low all day, or in the oven all night on a low heat in the Rayburn. Serve with fresh crusty bread.

BLACKBERRY & APPLE JELLY

1.4kg (3lb) Blackberries 450g (1lb) apples 225g (½lb) caster sugar preserving sugar water



Husk berries, rough chop apples, put both in a large bowl with caster sugar and 570ml (1 pint) water; stand in a very slow oven till apples are stewed and juice of berries runs (this can be done in a covered pan on a very low heat on the stove with a heat diffuser under the pan); strain through jelly bag; put juice in pan with 600g preserving sugar per litre juice, stirring till sugar is dissolved; boil about ¾ h stirring frequently, skimming as necessary; pot and cover when cold.

BLACKBERRY AND APPLE JAM

450g (1lb) blackberries

450g (1lb) cooking apples (when peeled and cored)

910g (2lb) sugar

70ml (1/8 pint) water

Slice apples, put in pan with water, simmer until tender; add berries, simmer for a further 10 minutes or till soft; add sugar, stirring until dissolved, then boil fast to set.

HOW DOES THE DIRECTOR SYSTEM WORK?

Every year at the Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust AGM, at least a third (to the nearest round number) of the elected members of the Community Trust have to stand down. This can be by choice or in circumstances whereby no Directors want to leave then the three longest serving Directors have to step down and can choose to re-stand if they wish.

This year, Catriona Fraser, Gareth Jones and Ken Sinclair are stepping down. Only Ken Sinclair will re-stand for election. We are hugely indebted for the time and effort both Catriona and Gareth have put in over the years.

The maximum vacancies for elected Directors this year is four. If more than four nominations are received, this would trigger an election where all members of the Trust would get to vote. Without the amazing volunteer Directors, the Trust would not be able to function and we encourage anyone living in the community to apply to become a Director. You do have to be

an ordinary member of the Community Trust but that can be applied for prior to the closing date of nominations if you are not already a member.

The board is made up of elected Directors, of which there is a maximum of nine (we currently have eight) and co-opted directors, of which there is a maximum three (we currently have two). Directors are co-opted on the basis that they have specialist experience and/or skills which could be of assistance to the directors and do not have to be members of the Trust. In addition to this, the directors are able to co-opt one individual as nominated by the Stratherrick and Foyers Community Council to be a director. All co-opted Directors step down at each AGM and it is up to the new board to co-opt again following the AGM.

RIVERSIDE FIELD

In late June Stratherrick & Foyers
Community Trust directors met with members
of the River Foyers Residents Group to
discuss their concerns over the Riverside
Field Project. It was useful for the Directors
to hear their over-riding concerns and we
have taken away some pertinent points
which will hopefully lead to better
communication and actions from Stratherrick
& Foyers Community Trust. Meantime,
Stratherrick & Foyers Community Trust are
still awaiting information from Highland
Council regarding the purchase of the
playpark and the land needed for the

provision of 4 parking spaces as laid out in our pre-planning conditions.

No meetings have been held of the Liaison Group because of the summer break and until such time as we hear back from Highland Council, meetings have been put on hold.

Our previous CEO Tony Foster met with HighLife Highland and Sport Scotland to discuss the Riverside plans and to seek their advice. With his departure, the Steering Group will not meet until the new CEO is appointed to discuss their suggestions for the project.

FOYERS BAY

Following the effective re-launch of Foyers Bay as a project last Autumn, much has been achieved to improve the facility, and a lot of work has been done behind the scenes by volunteers, directors and staff. This includes:

Landscaping works onsite – two phases of landscaping works have now been completed, including shore and compound clean up and temporary improvement to access of the loch. The latest work has seen the final transition of the slipway improved along with landscaping to make the facility more accessible to the community. Work will be commencing shortly on levelling the ground within the internal compound to make it suitable for boat storage.

Floating moorings installed – There are now 4 community-owned floating moorings available for members of this community to use. These are the only community-owned moorings on Loch Ness.

New membership structure – in order to successfully manage access to the facility, a



new membership structure has been introduced. This will encourage community buy-in and shared ownership as well as generate funds to help cover running and maintenance costs and generate funds to further develop the project. The group have discussed the erection of a boat shed in the secure compound to provide a workshop space for boat maintenance, the construction of a club house and changing facilities, and also the purchase of paddleboards, kayaks and dinghies for community use. Any money raised through membership will help fund these ambitions. Membership fees were

discussed and unanimously agreed at the last steering group meeting as follows:

- Tier 1: Daily access to slipway, plus access to book floating moorings.
- Deposit of £10 for key, annual fee of £75.
 20% discount for concessions OAP, students, disabilities.
- Tier 2: Access to boat storage in secure compound, water and electricity. Daily access to slipway and booking floating moorings.
- Deposit of £10 for key, annual fee of £150 for one vessel. Additional vessels will be charged at £75 per vessel. 20% discount for concessions – OAP, students, disabilities.
- Floating moorings: Booked on a weekly basis, for a maximum of 4 consecutive weeks to prevent users 'blocking' the moorings.
- Weekly cost of £7. This will be reviewed regularly, dependent on demand.

Please also note that pedestrian access to the Bay path will not be interrupted – this path will remain open to all walkers, and access to the loch is still possible for swimmers, kayakers and paddleboarders. A booking system similar to the one used for The Wildside Centre has been proposed and the staff team are working on this for launch in Spring 2025.

We then move on to doing 30 minutes of toning combined with some Pilates and stretching but,
