

CHAIR'S BRIEFING

Better economic data is in the news, and it could not come too soon. If anyone says a relatively prosperous looking place like ours has avoided the worst of the cost-of-living crisis, don't believe it. Many thanks to the team at the Knockie Trust for the work they have done reviewing applications for the cost-of-living grants that are being funded by the Community Benefit funds.

By the closing date, the Trust had received close to 60 applications, which equates to somewhere between 150 and 200 adults and children; a significant proportion of the 800 men, women and children who live in our area.

The stories behind the applications are quite upsetting. The vast majority relate to help with fuel bills to keep the heating on (during one of the colder winters) and to buy food for their children.

The £25,000, approved by our funders, has now been exhausted and we will keep you posted on when it next opens, probably towards the end of the year when the cold weather strikes again.

There is encouraging news, we appear to be getting close to getting all the big legacy projects in play. Work on restoring Errogie Church started this week and the steering group for Riverside is up and running. Many thanks to Highland Councillor Chris Ballance for the time he is giving to this project to help us get to a place where we can work together on this project with a degree of harmony.

Good news too from Hugh Nicol, chair of the Stratherrick Public Hall Committee. The building should re-open towards the end of February. Look out for the invitation to the celebration! Although Hugh does warn 'best laid schemes o' mice an' men gang aft a-gley! Our fingers are crossed that we will hear shortly from The Highland Council on the plans for a slipway at Foyers Bay.

So that's buildings; there's also good news on the people front. Community volunteers are again stepping out from behind the shadow of the pandemic and lockdown. What is incredibly encouraging is a willingness to lead the community action groups that were established to implement the Community Action Plan. Many thanks to Graeme Ambrose for stepping into the chair of the Paths Action Group and Peter Faye is driving, in his own inimitable style! the Housing Action Group. The Heritage Society, led by the irrepressible Alister Chisholm, is putting together a whole scheme of work to protect the heritage of the area for future generations.

Meanwhile, Sarah Byrne, one of the Trust's fund raisers, has landed a chunk of

money (thanks again Chris B) from The Highland Council to buy 3 Polycrubs (just Google it!) to provide under-cover space for a Community Growing project. First to take delivery will by the Resident's Group at Inverfarigaig. I'm writing this listening to Foyers Bay Radio which reminds me – Gary, it's not quite a community farm but that will come next!

Thanks to all the other volunteers that are doing great work – including the Soup To Go team which is looking for support (see Page 7)

There is, though, a very significant gap in the volunteer army. We need someone from the community to pick up the environmental baton. Who is out there, preferably as a director, or as an Action Group leader, to push forward projects to protect and enhance the biodiversity of the area? Please drop me an email at gareth-dir@sfctrust.org.uk for further info.

As all this activity gathers pace and the community starts to take control of its destiny (e.g. The Highland Council is adopting your 'Place Plan') we can start to dream of a potential goal; Stratherrick and Foyers becomes a truly self-sufficient community. This will be the best way of creating certainty and security in a world that is becoming increasingly chaotic, complex, and unpredictable.

BUS TIMETABLES

Highland Council now runs the buses!

Highland Council has taken over the buses which run between Foyers and Inverness and between Whitebridge and Inverness. Stagecoach stopped running the routes on 4th January 2023.

Highland Council took the step of buying twelve buses to run a pilot project for a number of school-based routes.




